The Joy of Repentance

The first message of the kingdom of God has always been one of repentance. Repentance is a change of mind that leads to a change of behavior specifically in refraining from sin. When John the baptist began to preach, he said, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 3:2). Likewise, Jesus also began his ministry by preaching, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 4:17). After Jesus ascended to heaven and the Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles, they also preached repentance (Acts 2:38; 3:19). Still today, repentance must be part of the message whenever the gospel of Christ is preached (Acts 26:20).

When sinners obey the gospel's message of repentance, it brings great joy to God. This is because He is "not wishing for any to perish but for all to come to repentance" (2Pet. 3:9). God desires for sinners to live rather than die, and repentance is a necessary step for them to escape death. This has always been true, just as He emphatically declared in these passages from Ezekiel:

- Ezekiel 18:23 "Do I have any pleasure in the death of the wicked," declares the Lord GoD, "rather than that he should turn from his ways and live?"
- Ezekiel 18:32 "For I have no pleasure in the death of anyone who dies," declares the Lord God. "Therefore, repent and live."
- Ezekiel 33:11 "Say to them, 'As I live!' declares the Lord God, 'I take no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but rather that the wicked turn from his way and live. Turn back, turn back from your evil ways! Why then will you die, O house of Israel?'"

In Luke 15, Jesus gave three parables that show God's joy over sinners who repent. In the parable of the lost sheep, the shepherd leaves his flock of ninety-nine to find the one lost sheep. When he finds it, he calls together his friends and neighbors to rejoice with him. Jesus said, "I tell you that in the same way, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance" (v. 7). In the parable of the lost coin, a woman with ten coins sweeps her house in search of the one she has lost. When she finds it, she calls her friends and neighbors to rejoice with her. Jesus applied the lesson, saying, "In the same way, I tell you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents" (v. 10). In the parable of the prodigal son, the

father called for a great celebration when his rebellious son returned to him. He said, "This son of mine was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found" (v. 24). Each of these parables illustrates the great joy of God for each soul who returns to Him in the "repentance that leads to life" (Acts 11:18).

If there is such great joy in heaven over one soul who repents, then there should be joy among Christians as well. We are citizens of heaven (Phil. 3:20), and our minds should be set on the things above (Col. 3:2), so we should share in heaven's jubilation. No Christian should be like the brother of the prodigal son, who was bitter and resentful when his father celebrated his brother's restoration. Regardless of how unworthy a sinner or a fallen brother may be, if he comes to the Lord in faithful repentance, we should rejoice with our Father in heaven.

Furthermore, it should be our ambition to bring joy to heaven by causing sinners to repent. To do this, we will have to preach the gospel to them and tell them to cease from sin. This is not easy, for sinners will often resist and resent this message. No one enjoys hearing that they are wrong and condemned, but those who are convinced that Jesus is the Savior will grieve for their sins and seek to change. This sorrow is painful, but it will soon be overshadowed by the joy that results from repentance and salvation. Like Paul, we will be able to say to sinners who repent, "I now rejoice, not that you were made sorrowful, but that you were made sorrowful to the point of repentance" (2Cor. 7:9).

Because God gives us so much joy in so many ways, it seems only fitting that we would wish to give Him joy in return. If you have never obeyed the gospel of Christ, then believe in Jesus, confess your faith in Him, repent of your sins, and be baptized in His name for forgiveness (Acts 2:38; 8:37; Rom. 10:8-10), and you will bring great joy to your heavenly Father. If you are a Christian and there is sin in your life, then repent of that sin (Acts 8:22) and cause a celebration in heaven. If you have influence on a sinner that has never submitted to Jesus or a brother or sister in Christ who has fallen away from the Lord, then do what you can to bring that person to the repentance that leads to life (Jas. 5:19-20). If someone who has offended you comes to the Lord in repentance, then do not be bitter or resentful but rather be forgiving and join in the joy of heaven. By doing such things, we can bring joy to our great God and joy to ourselves as well.
