Righteousness Exalts a Nation

Well, it is election season again (isn't it always?), and that means politicians and pundits are breathlessly begging for every vote they can get. If you watch the cable news channels, then you have seen the round-the-clock election coverage that overshadows every other story. Even the non-election news stories usually have some connection to a candidate or a party. Invariably, someone will say about each election, "This is the most important election in our nation's history." Judging by the endless obsession with elections, you might even think they are the most important things in the world!

Of course, elections matter. As President Obama famously said, "Elections have consequences." We have to live with the laws, policies, and judgments that arise from the people we elect. When Israel elected to have a king, God warned them of the consequences, and they suffered these consequences throughout the history of the kingdom (1Sam. 8:10-22). Our own nation now suffers the consequences of elections from generations ago.

However, the overt emphasis on elections is badly mistaken and misplaced. The idea is implied that elections are all that matter and that if we can just elect the right people, then all of our problems will be solved. That idea is preposterous. When has this ever happened? The answer is never.

What matters more than elections is the character of the nation itself. Nothing states this more clearly or succinctly than Proverbs 14:34:

Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a disgrace to any people.

It is just that simple. When the people and the government of a nation do right, the nation is lifted up. When the people and the government of a nation practice, sanction, endorse, and celebrate sin, the nation is brought down in self-inflicted disgrace. Consider Psalm 9:15-17:

¹⁵The nations have sunk down in the pit which they have made; in the net which they hid, their own foot has been caught. ¹⁶The LORD has made Himself known; He has executed judgment. In the work of his own hands the wicked is snared. ¹⁷The wicked will return to Sheol, even all the nations who forget God.

The principle of Proverbs 14:34 means that one election cannot move a nation from a state of disgrace to a state of exaltation. Regardless of who is elected, a nation that is awash in sin is still disgraceful, and it

will continue to suffer the consequences of turning away from God as long as it continues in sin. Notice what God said about Judah in Jeremiah 15:1:

Then the LORD said to me, "Even though Moses and Samuel were to stand before Me, My heart would not be with this people; send them away from My presence and let them go!"

For us, this means that even if Moses or Samuel were living and could be elected as president of the United States, neither could save the nation from ruin if the people have rejected God.

So then, the greater emphasis should be placed upon turning the hearts of our nation's citizens to God. This is a much harder task than simply voting in an election. People do not like change, and sinners rarely wish to give up their sin. Even so, the process of turning to God is not as difficult as some may perceive. Consider Moses' words to Israel in Deuteronomy 10:12-13:

¹²"Now, Israel, what does the LORD your God require from you, but to fear the LORD your God, to walk in all His ways and love Him, and to serve the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, ¹³and to keep the LORD's commandments and His statutes which I am commanding you today for your good?"

Of course, the United States is not Israel and has no special standing before God. However, the general requirements and expectations of God for any nation are not complicated or burdensome. The difficulty lies in convincing people to repent of their sins. To do that, Christians must preach and exemplify the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Yes, elections matter, but we have a greater opportunity to effect real change in the people around us. Our first responsibility is to seek God's righteousness ourselves (Matt. 6:33), and then we can reflect the light of God to lead others to Him (Matt. 5:14-16). We can also teach others about Jesus Christ and His gospel so that they may become righteous through faith in Him (Rom. 4:5; 5:1). We should also take advantage of our access to God to pray "on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity" (1Tim. 2:1-2). If all Christians in our nation will do these things, then we will not only affect the course of our nation for the better, but more importantly we will lead souls to salvation.
