Religion and Marxism

What does Karl Marx have to do with modern practices of religion? The answer is far too much. Karl Marx was a nineteenth century German philosopher, economist, and atheist. His socioeconomic theory asserted that mankind's social problems were due to struggles between the ruling class who owned most things and the workers who provided labor. Marx viewed religion as a reaction of the working class to oppression. He believed that the working class had invented religion to give themselves hope amid their misery.

Marx' proposed solution to social problems was to dissolve the classes by abolishing private ownership and having all people work for a common purpose. He and another German, Friedrich Engels, authored the Communist Manifesto in 1848 as a presentation of their view and a call for communist revolutions around the world. As for religion, Marx believed that the implementation of communism would cause it to disappear because the material conditions that caused religion would be gone. Religion would then be replaced by naturalistic humanism in which man and nature would live in harmony.

Marx was wrong about everything, including religion. Every time societies have attempted to implement his solutions, the results have been disastrous. It is estimated that 100 million people have been put to death or have died as a direct result of communism in the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, China, North Korea, Vietnam, Cambodia, and Cuba. For the most part, religion did not disappear in these nations but was banned because it opposed the objectives of their communist governments.

Nevertheless, the influence of Karl Marx remains strong throughout the world and within many churches that claim to follow Christ. Many followers in these churches are not aware that they are being taught Marxism because they do not know what it is. Their leaders have deceived them by twisting the gospel of Christ to conform to Marxism. They attempt to change the gospel's focus from spiritual salvation from sin to worldly liberation from oppression.

To avoid being deceived, Christians need to be aware of Marxist teachings and the contrast between them and the teachings of Christ. Religion corrupted by Marxism emphasizes worldly results and collective solutions. It is the so-called liberation theology that presents salvation as deliverance from oppression in the world. Contrary to that, Jesus "rescues us from the wrath to come" (1Thess. 1:10). Specifically, individual believers in Jesus seek to be saved from the wrath of God that will come against those who have sinned against Him (Rom. 1:18; 5:9; 2Thess. 1:6-9). Freedom in Jesus is not about liberation from worldly oppression, but rather it is freedom from the spiritual slavery of sin (John 8:31-36).

It is also necessary to keep a proper perspective on areas where Marxism appears to share common ground with the gospel. Marxism is founded on a professed concern for oppressed classes, and the gospel is concerned with

persons who are burdened with hardships (Gal. 6:10; Jas. 1:27). However, the motivations, solutions, and outcomes of Marxism versus those of the gospel are radically different and incompatible. Marxism is opposed to God and considers His worship as an obstacle to be removed, whereas Christians seek to do good because of God and view their primary mission as the eternal salvation of lost souls through Jesus (Luke 19:10; Rom. 1:16-17).

If Marxism continues to gain influence in churches, then they will become unrecognizable in terms of the New Testament. This transformation is already apparent as many churches have become focused on social programs rather than evangelism. The shift has been made away from "the food which endures to eternal life" to "the food which perishes" (John 6:27). Their main goal has become solving the social problems among men rather than reconciling man to God through Jesus (Eph. 2:11-22). How sad it is that so many churches are now following the philosophy of an atheist rather than the blessed gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ.
