
> Review:

Thought: The word religious occurs only in James 1:26 in the New testament. It is an adjective describing the thinking of the Christian who believes himself to be religious before God. In reality, his heart is deceived, and his religion is vain. James 1:27 reveals that an unbridled tongue is the outward evidence of his vain religion.

God reveals to us briefly, in verse 27, and throughout the book of James, what religious worship is before him (from his standpoint, in his sight, or such as he approves). It is his obvious intent that the error of vain religious practice be avoided by the recipients of James letter along with other Christians of every age who study this book.

It is now important to confirm who the recipients of the of the book of James are.

I. Introduction

In lesson two we learn what God has reveal to us in the book of James about **who the** persons are who practice either pure religion and vain religion. We do this by understanding from the internal evidence of the book to whom the letter of James is written.

We begin this series looking at who God reveals through James to be the recipients of this letter. Their identity helps us to understand and properly apply the passages in this letter that describe the persons practicing pure religion and vain religion. In James letter the words pure and the words vain are a description of the *moral* condition and the *outward religious conduct* of the persons practicing "Pure Religion", and the persons practicing "Vain Religion".

- **a. Strong:** (properly the feeling of *brotherliness*), that is, (the (Christian) *fraternity:*
- **b. Thayer** a family of brothers, the brotherhood, a band of brothers, i.e. Christians I Pet 2:17, 5:9
 - 1. I Peter 2:17...Love the Brotherhood..I Pet 1:22
 - 2. <u>I Peter 5:9</u>....With reference to keeping the Faith with all the Brotherhood undergoing temptation

5. Beloved agapētos ag-ap-ay-tos:

to Christians as being reconciled to God and being Judged by him to be worthy of eternal life

James 1: 1-2 The letter of James is addressed to the twelve tribes scattered abroad. We will learn from many passage in this letter that the recipients of James letter are beloved brethren, who have experienced

the good and perfect gift of new birth **James 1:17-18.** They were apparently experiencing personal trials and the temptations to sin that always accompany Christian trails **James 1:2-4, 12-16 I Peter 5:8-10.**

I. James Address his recipients as "My Brethren"

Asv Jas 1:2 Count it all joy, **my brethren**, when ye fall into manifold temptations;

RV Jas 1:2 Count it all joy, <u>my brethren</u>, when ye fall into manifold temptations;

MKJV Jas 1:2 My brothers, count *it* all joy when you fall into different kinds of temptations,

> **Brethren**: <u>James</u>: 1:16, 1:19, 2:1, 2:5, 2:14, 3:1, 3:10, 3:12, 4:11, 5:7, 5:9, 5:10, 5:12, 5:19

> **Brother**: <u>James</u>: 1:9, 2:15, 4:11

Sister: James: 2:15

A. <u>Observation:</u> in KJV James repeatedly identifies the recipients of his letter as brethren. In at-least one passage he refers to them as **brothers and sisters** with basic benevolent needs.

- > Thoughts On Meaning and use of Key words: The word brethren, brother and sister in James letter is undoubtedly consistent with the definitions given by Thayer's in other books of the New Testament.
- > Thayer's Greek Lexicon defines the word for sister in James 2:15 as "<u>one connected by the tie of the Christian Religion</u>". Obviously from the context the word brother in this verse means the same thing.

III There are two other key references that show that the recipients of James letter are fellow believers and members of the same Family.

Jas 1:16 Do not err, my beloved rethren.

Jas 1:18 Of his own will **begat he us** with the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.

James refer to the recipients of his letter as *My Beloved Brethren*

James states that they had been **birthed by God**, and that he also is one who had experience new birth along with them.

IV. Conclusion



Thought: Conclusion: The question "any among who?", from James 1:26, is answered by the many references in the book of James to the identity of his recipients. His recipients were referred to as his brethren, his beloved brethren, and his sister or brother. There are

about 17 references throughout James letter that identify his recipients Christians. I believe that this is ample internal evidence to show that the recipients of James letter were Christians.

Their identity helps us to understand and apply the passages in this letter that describe the persons practicing pure religion and vain religion. In James letter the words pure and the words vain are a description of the *inner heart* condition and the *outward religious conduct* of the persons practicing "Pure Religion", and the persons practicing "Vain Religion".

I. Brethren,

1. Strongs G80 adelphos *ad-el-fos'*: From <u>G1</u> (as a connective particle) and delphus (the *womb*); a *brother* (literally or figuratively) near or remote (much like [H1]): - brother.
