So we see Moses in Exodus chapters 3 and 4 at the age of 80, having very little to show as his accomplishments in He was a tongue tied shepherd with an life. inferiority complex who had trouble putting his thought together. There was absolutely nothing about his appearance or his disposition that would mark him as a mighty leader.

Yet, after he had spent 40 years thinking he was somebody, and 40 years learning he was nobody, he spent the last 40 years of his life discovering what God can do with a nobody. When Moses submitted to the Lord and allowed the Lord to direct him, he became one of the greatest leaders the world has ever known. The Lord asked Moses a simple question, "What is that – in thy hand?" Moses answered, "A rod". It was an ordinary rod, made of wood, fashioned for a specific purpose, most likely a staff or a shepherd's crook. It did not have any jewels on it, there was no elaborate ornamentation on it, and it was never owned by a king or a queen.

Something that was a simple stick in the hand of Moses, became by the power of God the force that brought the plagues on the land of Egypt, divided the Red Sea so that the people cold cross, delivered a mighty nation from bondage, brought water from a rock and won a battle. God gives mighty powers to small things. Weak men under the direction of the Lord become mighty leaders. Little sticks in the hands of men become mighty powers in the hands of God.

The young shepherd boy David had nothing in his hand but 5 smooth small stones and a sling. Yet, he was going up against a giant with a spear as large as a weaver's beam. Yet, as David went out that day to face Goliath, David came in the name of the Lord and that made all the difference. That made a puny sling and five small stones mighty in the hand of that Shepherd Boy.

In Damson's hand one day there was only the dry jaw bone of an ass. Yet, by the power of God it became a lethal weapon. It was capable of destroying the enemy. The widow of I Kings 17 had only a little meal and a cruse of oil. Yet, according to the word of the prophet of God, she surrendered her meal and oil to God. It became enough provision for the woman, her son and the prophet of God for a very long time.

So the nail released its hold of the roof shingle it had been holding in place, then slid down the roof and fell into a muddy patch of ground.


