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The Power of Love

When Paul wrote the letter to the church at Rome, he included some practical duties involved in living the Christian life. In fact, in chapter 12 and verses 20 and 21, we find these words; "therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him, if he thirst, give him drink; for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."

Of all the forces in the universe, love is the most powerful. It is more powerful than physical force or sarcasm. It is more powerful than "faking someone over the coals" with a stern rebuke and stronger than any argument.

We must realize that every emotion that we have, good or bad, reacts upon us. If we harbor hatred and bitterness in our heart, the individual we hate suffers as a result of our hatred. Yet, they do not suffer to the degree that we suffer. We cannot hurt our brother or sister without hurting ourselves. Hatred is toxic. It is a mental poison which destroys the finest qualities of the soul.

On the other side, the individual we love is blessed by our love. Yet, no matter how much we love, they are not blessed to the degree that we are blessed. We cannot offer aid and help to our fellow traveler on life's way without helping ourselves. Granted, sometimes our love may fail to touch the heart of our enemy, but it is never in vain. Love extended toward others purifies us, makes us more like God and makes us fit for heaven.

When others become aware of our love, happy results will follow. You see, love overcomes. It disarms the foe, hushes the cynic, and puts the enemy to shame. Whenever drastic methods fail as they always do, love wins. The wise man put it this

way in Proverbs 15:1; "A soft answer turneth away wrath; but grievous words stir up anger."

While hatred drives people from us, love draws them to us and it binds them to us. Love is the cement, the bond. In Colossians chapter 2 and verse 2 Paul talks about Christians being "knit together in love" and then in chapter 3 and verse 14 he tells us love is the "bond of perfectness". It is the element that preserves the unity of the people of God. Love brings out that which is noble and encouraging. Love makes life worth living.

When we have love in our hearts, it causes the great Spiritual Force in the universe to operate in our favor. Love reaches up from earth and takes hold of the throne of the Almighty and moves it. God takes up his abode in the loving heart and by deeds of love, the divine memory is refreshed. Listen to the words of the Hebrew writer in chapter 6 and verse 10; "For God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love, which ye have shewed toward his name, in that ye have ministered to the saints and do minister."

When our lives and our actions are motivated by love, life is sweeter, the circle of our influence is wider and we are more powerful. Jesus said that by our love for each other, all men would know we are His disciples.

With a red and angry face she exclaimed, "I'll never darken this door again!" Before the astonished preacher could recover from the blast another said, "Well preacher, if I had known you were close by last week, I would have been more careful of what I said." A third said, "I think that you might at least have come to me privately about this rather than telling it to the whole church". A fourth remarked, "I was never so embarrassed in all my life."

Then came the real culprit-the one at whom the preacher had aimed all his remarks. The one the preacher had heard utter the oaths and profanity. With a bland and innocent smile, he grasped the hand of the preacher and said, "Brother, that was what I call a real sermon. You certainly did pour it on them today."

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How Do You Treat People?

"But he willing to justify himself, said unto Jesus, And who is my neighbor" (Luke 10:29)

The lawyer had asked the question concerning what he should do to have eternal life, and Christ had told him to love God and to love his neighbor as himself. The implied lesson is that the lawyer did not love his neighbor, for he attempted to justify himself by asking the identity of his neighbor. To teach him the lesson he needed, Jesus taught the parable of the Good Samaritan. The priest and the Levite saw the man who had been beaten and robbed, but left him as he was. The Samaritan rendered assistance to the injured man and thereby showed himself to be a neighbor and also that he considered the man who needed his assistance his neighbor.

By our conduct, we demonstrate to others our consideration of them, just as the good Samaritan did in the case of the man who had been robbed. Had he passed by on the other side as did the priest and the Levite, he would have shown himself to be no different. So it is our treatment of those with whom we come in contact. Our actions and our words toward them and about them show the way that we consider them. Christianity is a religion that is to be manifested toward all, it makes no difference who it is. Even our enemies are to be prayed for, to be blessed, and are to receive from us those things that are good. It is Christ like to be humble, kind and forbearing. It is devilish to be any other way. Say, how do you treat people?
