Let's Visit

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Be Ye Kind

Ephesians chapter 4 is like a gold mine of scripture. There are many rich nuggets there for our learning. It is in that chapter that God's 7 point program of unity is put forward. In verse 3 we are exhorted to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace. Verse 15 encourages us to speak the truth in love. In verse 25 Paul pleads to put off lying and speak the truth with our neighbors. Verse 26 tells us to be angry and not sin. All of these passages are valuable for our consideration.

While Jesus was on earth, he preached in the synagogue in Capernaum. In John 6 we are told that when he finished preaching, many of his disciples said about his sermon, "this is a hard saying, who can hear it?" Well, in Ephesians 4:31-32 we have one of those "hard sayings" of the New Testament. Here Paul writes, "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking be put away from you, with all malice; And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

There is a law of purity which forbids all manner of uncleanness. It forbids adultery, fornication, lasciviousness and such things. The law of purity is binding and those who violate it dishonor God. They also suffer grave consequences. Just as there is a law of purity, there is a law of kindness. The law of kindness is just as binding as the law of purity. Those who violate it also dishonor God. They also bring upon themselves divine displeasure.

Being kind means that we are to be kind in our thoughts. What we would like for others to think about us, we should think about them. We do not want others to think evil of us, to be bitter in heart toward us or be angry at us. We do not want others to hold malice against us. We therefore should not think evil of others. We must think good of them.

We also must be certain that we are kind with the

words we speak. As someone once wisely said, "always make your words soft and sweet in the event you someday have to eat them." What we want others to say about us, we should say about tem. Whether to our face or behind our back (the preferred method of most folks!) we want others to speak well of us. We would not want them to tell ugly tales about us, to smear our good name or speak unkindly about us to their friends. Well, then, we must not speak evil of others.

We want others to say good things about us. We want them to recognize our good deeds and noble traits of character. We want them to promote friendly relationships. Since this is what we want from others, we are under solemn obligation to say good things about them.

This also involves being kind in our actions. It would be good for us to remember a "hard saying of Jesus" from Matthew 7:12 "Whatsoever ye would that men should do unto you, do ye even so unto them." We do not want others to do unkind things to us, we would not want them to injure our body, our wound our spirit, destroy our property or hurt the people we love. Then, we must do no injury to them.

We want others to perform kind deeds toward us and help us in times of misfortune. We want them to lift us up when we are fallen. If we want others to be kind to us, then God requires we be kind to them.

"For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21)



Across The Preacher's Desk

King David could not build a temple, but he wrote a psalm! Three temples, one after another, crumbled in the dust, but the psalm lives today in the hearts of millions. Through three thousand years, the Twenty-Third Psalm has been a source of inspiration. It is the Christian's great symphony, the theme of which is God's care for His own.

"The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want." Or, as Paul says it, "My God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus"

After announcing the theme, the writer gives us the three R's of the abundant life. They are Rest, Refreshment and Restoration. First, "He maketh me to lie down in green pastures." Second, "He leadeth me beside the still waters." Third, "He resotreth my soul."

Rest and relaxation are essential to our well being. Many a man or woman is in the hospital today because they could not afford to rest or could not rest. God makes us rest and then he leads us beside the still waters for refreshment. Restoration just naturally follows rest and refreshment. How wonderful are the still waters that God leads us to. Hopefully, after spending time in worship, you will come away rested, refreshed and restored.
