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A Cry For Mercy

If you remember, last Lord's day, we took our text from Psalm 51 and talked about "The Prayer of a Murderer". To my mind, there is no poem or prayer which surpasses that 51st Psalm in depth of feeling or ardor of expression. It is a classic in the literature of penitence. During the long years of its life it has proved itself to be both a challenge and a solace to countless thousands of men and women who, having realized something of the enormity of their sins, have been filled with self-loathing and a longing for reconciliation with God. Even after 30 centuries, this Psalm is frequently found in the hands or upon the lips of those who fear God. The 130th Psalm is comparable to it, but it is less personal.

The Psalm actually presents one of the most pathetic scenes in human experience. It deals with a problem which is beyond human solution. Even though its subject is a king with armies and mighty men to do his bidding, and with multitudes of animals for sacrifice at his disposal, he is, nevertheless, helpless sinner, naked a defenseless and without any possible means of escape or deliverance. But with all that, he is not without hope, for he can turn to God and that is exactly what he does. In deep penitence he confesses his sin and implores God for mercy.

In order to fully appreciate the Psalm, we must consider it in the light of the facts as they are set forth in II Samuel 11 and 12. It is there that we find David as he sins with Bathsheba and then in order to cover his sin, he has her husband Uriah murdered in battle. Nathan, God's prophet, comes to David and calls David's sin to his attention. The 51st Psalm is written as a result of David being reminded of his sin.

When we look at the passage in Psalm 51, we see David's cry for mercy is based on his contrite confession. Man's greatest need is for forgiveness, but he must realize that it can be obtained only through the loving kindness and tender mercy of God. Yet, though a loving God delights to forgive the sins of his people, the sinner has no right to expect that blessing until he confesses his wrongdoing, turns away from it, and then does that which God requires of him.

David therefore, promptly turned his attention to his sin, and he emphasized the magnitude of it by using three words to picture the different aspects of sin. He refers to it as transgression, iniquity and sin. Transgression is to rebel against God, to set oneself against the will and law of God. Iniquity is a perversion or distortion. It its moral application is depravity of conduct. Then there is sin, which has a literal meaning of missing the mark, that is God's mark for us.

In his confession of wrong-doing, David bewailed his act of sin and the disposition which led to the act of sin. David prayed that he might be received into God's presence again and that he might be fit for his presence. In a pathetic tone, David begged God not to cast him away from his presence, as had been done to Adam and Eve. In the case of David, to be cast away from God's presence was the equivalent to being denied the privilege of worship and service according to the law.

We learn from the Psalm that no man can please God who ignores God's law for him. We must live God's kind of life, God's way.


