Let's Visit

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Seed Sowing

While our Lord was upon the earth, he spoke four parables on seed sowing. These are the lakeside parables recorded in Matthew chapter 13, Mark chapter 4 and Luke chapter 8. These parables were intended to encourage His people for the great trials ahead of them.

In the parable of the sower, Jesus taught His disciples that some of their preaching would be in vain. Some of the seed would fall into wayside hearts and never produce at all. If we are inclined to be discouraged when we see our efforts at teaching go for naught, the Lord is saying in this parable that He knew such would be the case.

Then, there are a great many people in the church who live far below their possibilities. They could do a great deal more than they are doing. It is discouraging sometimes to see people live so far below their potential. So Jesus told us about the people who would do only a small portion of the good they were capable of doing. Later when some Christians denied the Lord and blasphemed His name, they were to remember that the Lord had foreseen the weaknesses and failures of men and to take heart and press on.

Then there is the parable of the tares which also belongs in this list. Somehow, when we look and expect encouragement and strength from our brethren and find only discouragement and weakness, we are inclined to lose heart. But when actual tares grow among the wheat and we find people wearing the name of Christ but acting like the devil, we needn't be surprised. Jesus had such people in His company. He spoke these words to teach us that this would be a continuing situation.

The Lord must have known that His disciples, being few in number, would be inclined to look at the enormous task of preaching to the whole world and five up and say we simply can't do it. So He spoke the parable of the mustard seed, giving us assurance of how the church would grow, how from a very small beginning it could become the greatest force on earth. He wanted us to have the courage to work and attempt what seemed to us impossible.

In Mark 4:26 Jesus tells the story of the man's planting and how in the process of time he slept. Yet, while he was working and while he was sleeping the forces of nature worked away and slowly produced a plant. He has taught us to know that our labor is not in vain in the Lord. Remember what Paul would write in I Corinthians 15:58. "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." Then again, "And let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap if we faint not." (Galatians 6:9)We can do those good things that the Lord has told us to do and while we sleep and while we wake the good seed of God's kingdom will germinate and bear fruit. Suddenly there will be the fruit of righteousness wherever the word fell into good soil. But the sower must wait with patience for the working of God's law. Let us do today's duties in all the confidence that God who does all things well will use us to His glory.

Is the message of the cross relevant for today? What is there for men and women of the 21st century? Can the events on a hill so long ago affect us now? Can the death of one man by crucifixion affect men and women when thousands can now be killed with one bobm? The answer is yes, yes the message of the cross is current and relevant. There are two short words in John's Gospel (John 19:28) that show us how current this message is. Those words are when Jesus says, "I thirst".

Jesus said, "I thirst" because Jesus died as a man. John's primary purpose was to show the deity of Jesus but in this passage he shows us the humanity of Jesus. Jesus came to feel what we feel and to know our needs. The human race had sinned and must die.

The fact that Jesus experienced that painful thirst brings new meaning to other passages. Even in our day and age with all its advancements, with cell phones and the internet and supersonic plane travel, people still die and go to hell.

Jesus knows our pain and our temptations. He knows the deep waters we pass through and he knows the storms that blow through our lives. Yet, through obedience to Jesus' commands and living His kind of life, the storms can be calmed and our thirst can be quenched. What we must do is surrender our stubborn human will to the will of Jesus, we must make Jesus Christ the Lord and Master of our lives. Not just part of our life, but ALL of our life.
