

LET'S VISIT

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"FOR CHRIST'S SAKE"

I remember as a small boy, often hearing people close their prayers with the phrase, "in Christ's name and for his sake we pray". Have you ever thought about that phrase? Have you ever wondered what we are saying with that expression? We are asking God to look upon the face of His Son and to deal with us on the merit of our suffering substitute.

However, this is only one side of the equation. God wants us to look upon the face of His Son and for Christ's sake suffer, serve and glorify the Father. We do a great many things for the sake of others. We hear parents say they will do many things "for the sake of my child". We ask people for favors, often on behalf of others and request, "would you do it for my sake". When we turn to the pages of the Bible, we see there things being done for the sake of others. In the long ago, God "for the sake of 10 righteous" would not destroy Sodom. David showed Mephibosheth kindness "for the sake of Jonathan". (II Samuel 9:7) God did not take the kingdom from Solomon during his lifetime "for the sake of David his father" (I Kings 11:12) Peter tells us in I Peter 2 that we are to obey the civil government "for the sake of the Lord". Paul entreated Philemon in behalf of Onesimus "for love's sake". Then, the Bible instructs us to do certain things for "Christ's sake".

Paul tells us in Ephesians 4:31-32 that we are to forgive one another as God for Christ's sake has forgiven us. If we are to be forgiven, it is imperative that we be willing to forgive others. Someone hurt your feelings, forgive them for Christ's sake. Someone loved your soul enough to warn you that forsaking the assembly was putting your soul in jeopardy and that made you mad and you quit the church. For Christ's sake be willing to forgive. Our

own forgiveness before God is preconditioned on our willingness to forgive others. Jesus tells us plainly in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5,6 and 7) that if we are not willing to forgive others, God will not forgive us. Peter writes later that we should follow in the steps of Jesus. It is so Christlike to have compassion and exercise forgiveness. Do you remember, on the cross he prayed and said, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do".

For the sake of Christ, we are to strive together in prayer. (Romans 15:30) If we would strive together in prayer more, we could bring more honor and glory to the Lord. In Acts 12, we see the church striving together in prayer. James has been put to death, and Peter is in prison awaiting the same fate. The church came together to unite and strive together in prayer. We should follow their example.

For the sake of Christ, we are to serve one another (II Corinthians 4:5). Paul tells us they did not preach for the purpose of bringing glory to themselves. Jesus did not come to be ministered unto but to minister. He came to give his life a ransom for many. Would you resolve to be more faithful in your service to the Lord? For Christ's Sake.



Unexpected dinner guests. Have you ever had that happen? That is what happens to Jesus and the disciples in Mark chapter 6. John the Baptist had just been killed and Jesus and the disciples were trying to get to a secluded place. They were tired from the teaching and healing being done. They were leading busy lives and needed a little R & R.

It is on this occasion that we find Jesus taking 5 loaves and 2 fish and feeding 5,000 men. Yet, notice the question Jesus asked them in Mark 6:38. He asked, "how many loaves have ye?"

Jesus was not asking for information. He was not asking because he couldn't do it without their loaves. He was, rather, trying to teach them and us a lesson. He wanted them and us to know that He is to bless others through us. He wanted those disciples to know they must be willing to use what they have. We must be willing to use what we have also.

You see, what we have must be given into His hands. We are to use our strength, our tongue and our heart. We are to use our material means. We are to be the earthen vessels in the service of Jesus. Jesus asks us today, "how many loaves have ye?". Are we using what we have, the talents He has given us, in His service?
