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Flourishing Like The Palm Tree

You read these words in Psalms 92:12; "*The righteous shall flourish like the Palm Tree.*" The Palm tree was popular with the Arab. In fact, there are more than 300 ways in which the various parts of the Palm tree can be utilized.

Actually, in terms of usefulness, there is no other tree equal to the Palm tree. The leaves and seeds of the tree provide sustenance for that mighty "ship of the desert", the camel. The leaves of the tree, which grow some six to eight feet in length are often used to provide the roof for shelter. From the foliage of the Palm tree couches are made and the branches are converted into cages and fences. From the fiber of the tree, thread and rope are spun and from the annual shots come sacks, baskets, fans, hats and sandals. The life of the tree is some 200 years, yet it is most productive from the 30th to the 80th hear.

Just like the Palm tree, Jesus also intended that the righteous shall be useful. Remember, Jesus referred to his disciples as the light of the world and the salt of the earth. The colleges, hospitals and places to assist the less fortunate all speak forth in eloquent language the part the righteous have played in giving to the world a finer and better civilization,. The righteous are like Jesus who "went about doing good".

Thinking of the analogy of the Psalmist, we contemplate the beauty of the Palm tree as it adorns the country in which it takes root. There is something stately about it. It has a dignity that belongs to it. What is more beautiful than the character of a righteous man? The kind of man spoken of in Psalms chapter 1. The man who walks not in the counsel of the ungodly, who does not sit in the seat of the scornful. The man whose delight is in

the law of the Lord and who meditates in that law day and night.

The righteous man is planted by the river of water in the purest of soil as is the Palm tree. You see, when young, the Palm tree is a very weak plant. The roots dig down among the foundations of the earth for nourishment. The Christian also must root himself deeply in good soil. It is the hidden roots that give him strength and poise to withstand the fury of the winds and storms of life. As the Palm trees grow, they interlock in root and branch and thereby they strengthen one another. Is that not a beautiful picture of the lives of Christians? The Palm tree, planted alone will die, it needs companionship and protection. In that same way, the Christian also needs the companionship and protection of other Christians.

All that is required of the Palm tree is that it grow and bear fruit. It functions in the place where it is found. It does not attempt to dictate to God, it just plays its part as a Palm tree and lets God present the laws by which it is to prosper. Yet the Palm tree does more than eke out an existence. The Palm tree flourishes. We grow in stature as we comply with the natural laws; we grow in mental ability when we give heed to the laws of both body and mind. We grow spiritually as we conform to the laws of God and as we grow, we bear fruit. The Psalmist would have us to understand that we too, shall grow and we too shall prosper and we shall flourish when we live the kind of life that God wants us to live. That is when we live a righteous life, with the ever present petition on our lips, "Thy will be done"



Too often they don't know that the cause of their misery is thei rown lack of productivity. They are doing so little that they have lost their enthusiasm for the work.

Have you found Christian service a burden? Don't laty the blame on others, but take a look at yourself. The joy of service is only for those who are serving. The joy of Bible Study and Worship is for those who atend and help in those activities.
