Compliments of Jesus

The general character of Jesus was such that he was a man of few words. If you were to ask him the time, He was not one of those who would tell you how to make a watch. Jesus also was not one who used flattery or exaggeration.

Though the complimentary things Jesus said were few, they were not superficial. Now, let's be honest. All of us appreciate a compliment provided it is sincere. In fact, we actually cannot get enough of them. I don't mean the kind of compliment we usually refer to as a "left-handed" compliment. You know the kind. Someone says to you, "That's been a good old suit. If those ever come back in style, I'm going to get me one." But you see, when Jesus gave someone a compliment, it had nothing to do with their clothing or style. It had to do with their heart and their character.

When Jesus first met Nathaniel, he said of him, "behold an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile" (John 1:47) There might have been a lot of other things Jesus could have said. He might have said that some were Israelites only in appearance. Perhaps he could have said some were Israelites according to the flesh. Some were only nominal Israelites. They offered sacrifices of repentance vet were not willing to change themselves. They came to the temple to worship but it was a hollow ritual. There were many who praised in public and were ungodly in private. Yet, when Jesus saw Nathaniel, he saw a man in whom there was nothing false. He saw a man who had no desire to deceive others. The fact that Jesus could see into his heart caused Nathaniel to marvel and he confessed his faith in Jesus as the son of God. It was then that Jesus told him that bigger and better things were coming (John 1:50).

Another that Jesus had high praise for was John the Baptist. There was a time that John found his faith weak. He was in prison because he had condemned the unholy marriage of Herod to Herodias. John sent his disciples to Jesus to ask if Jesus was the one or if they should look for another. John had been sent to prepare the way for Jesus. It was John who introduced Andrew to Jesus. Jesus told them that those who went out to see John saw a prophet and much more than a prophet. He said this about John, "Among those that are born of women there is not a greater prophet than John the Baptist." (Luke 7:28)

We could also mention Mary and the dinner in the home of Simon the Pharisee. She washed Jesus' feet with her tears and anointed them with expensive ointment. When she was criticized, Jesus told them to leave her alone because she had done what she could.

Yet, the words I want to hear the Master speak to me are in that story of the judgment in Matthew 25. The man with 2 talents and the man with 5 talents were both told, "*Well done, good and faithful servant*" (Matthew 25:23) When life is over and I stand before God in judgment, I want to hear those words. Yet, for us to hear those words, we must live God's kind of life. How are we doing with that?
