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How Does Success Come?

Someone has said, "A man who does a little more than he is asked to do, who takes a little more care than he is expected to, who puts the small details on an equal footing with the more important ones, is the man who is going to make a success of his job. Each little thing done better is the thin end of the wedge into something bigger." The principle of success is the same in all things. If we are able to transfer our training from one field to another we can become a success at many things. A man can be a success in business and a success in religion at the same time. Sadly, many people have never learned this lesson. To succeed in business, they often think they need to neglect religion. To succeed in religion they feel they are forced to neglect business.

Success does not come from complaining. Israel lost their right to the promised land largely because they were a complaining, murmuring, dissatisfied people. What was true of Israel is true of the Lord's people today. It is true in any work. If those who are doing the work are constantly complaining, you will usually find them complaining when they should be working. No organization can succeed with workers like that. When you find an organization going to pieces from within, when all outward advantages point to the possibility of success, you will usually find complaining prominently displayed throughout that organization. But if those connected with the organization are content with their lot, and working harmoniously toward the well being of the business, they are on a sure road to success. This is also true in our work for the Lord's church.

Success does not come from wishing and dreaming. There is nothing wrong with wishing, but it just does not get us any place. If our wishes and our dreams can be made real through our work, then they are good. Otherwise they only serve to create unrest and dissatisfaction. If you want to be as successful as someone you know, don't spend your time wishing. Find out the real reason for their success and get down to business. Success is always a culmination, and never a surprise. Those who succeed have known where they were going all along. They planned it that way. They were not afraid to take care of the small matters that make bigger things.

Success does not come from criticizing. One of the greatest failures of human beings is that of criticizing the success of others, and trying to blame others for their failure. Yet, every person can see that is only "whistling in the dark" as we have always heard. It is an effort to cover failure in our own hearts by offering criticism of our fellowman. However, while we are doing this, the man who looks after small matters and works at his job, continues to climb, while we only develop a nasty disposition which actually only does us harm.

It is easy to see that these principles are true in business. But they are also true in religion. When a church is composed of people who are not ashamed or afraid of the smallest details, who will work where they are, and who are in earnest about the building up of the body of Christ, it will always succeed. If Christ be for us, who can be against us.
