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WHY DON'T YOU GROW UP?

All of us at some time or another in our lives have either been asked the question or asked it of someone else, "Why don't you grow up"? No doubt, this expression can be traced to the beginning of man. Merely the fact that the question is asked suggests that an individual who has grown up should somehow be different from those who have not grown up. Theoretically it is something that separates between childhood and manhood.

Guess what. The older I get, and the longer I live and the more I associate with other "grown" people, the more inclined I am to believe that we would be wise to stop asking that question. I have almost reached the conclusion that people do not grow up. We are still children and yet we do not like to admit that we are.

Take a look at this in natural life. At the age of fifty, sixty or seventy, people are very little different from what they were when they were children. Of course, they have slowed down a little (or sometimes a lot!) Time has made many changes. In many instances the hair has either turned loose or turned gray and cleaning the teeth before bedtime involves putting them in a glass. But I am not talking about the physical changes that the ravages of time take on our bodies. We are talking about the attitude and disposition people have toward life and their reaction to various things. The problems and difficulties we hear about today among "grown ups" are not much different from those of younger people. It is just about as easy to find a man or woman pouting when they are 60 or 70 as to find one pouting at 20. You can find just as many older people (grown ups) saying "catty things about others as young people. Actually, I think we can find more. There are just as many older people who go around with a chip on

their shoulder, and who resent most everything others say and do as there are younger people. Emotionally, I wonder if people ever grow up. The body decays but the emotions seem to have a way of never changing.

There is a religious side to this question. In fact, it is the most important side. The writer of Hebrews found some people who had not grown up religiously. He said, "For when for the time ye ought to be teachers, ye have need that one teach you again which be the first principles of the oracles of God: and are become such as have need of milk and not of strong meat. For every one that useth milk is unskillful in the word of righteousness, for he is a babe. But strong meat belongeth to them that are of full age, even those who by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil." (Hebrews 5:12-14) Surely if there were people in that day who needed to grow up religiously, there are many in our own day and time. The only way we can do this is to feed on the "sincere milk of the word" until we are able to understand the deeper thoughts and teach them to others. It would not be difficult to find many who know no more about the word of God today than they did 40 years ago when they were baptized. Because of this, there is often more nursing going on in the church than feeding. Let's grow up in Christ.

Preach The Gospel!

Paul urged Timothy to preach the word because "the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine" (II Timothy 4:3) "Sound Doctrine" is literally, "healthful teaching".

A soul may be healthy as well as a body (II John 2). It is made and kept healthy by healthful teaching. But, there seems to be a tendency too often to equate sound doctrine with attacks on other religious groups, sermons on baptism etc.

G. C. Brewer, a giant among preachers in another day related an incident early in his career that illustrates this point. He began a meeting with a series of sermons on the love and mercy of God, the sacrifice of Christ, and followed these lessons with one on baptism for the remission of sins. After that sermon, a brother said to him, "Well, I knew if we waited long enough you would finally get around to preaching the gospel." After lessons on God's love and mercy, and the saving blood of Christ, he finally got around to the gospel!

And so it is. A sermon on why we baptize for the remission of sins is a "good, old fashioned gospel sermon." A lesson on selfishness or kindness is endured but little appreciated. At times a lesson on baptism or instrumental music is needed. But so is one that shows we may be baptized for the remission of sins and sing without the instrument and still not worship acceptably. A sermon about

observing the Lord's Supper each Sunday is a gospel sermon, and so is one that shows that we may partake of it each Sunday, every Sunday, and never really commune with Christ because of the condition of our heart.


