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Paul's Wastebasket

Paul's letter to the church at Philippi is one of his most encouraging letters. It was written to a church that was near and dear to his heart. It is not a letter like the first letter he wrote to Corinth. That letter dealt with divisions and immorality within the Corinthian church. It is a letter that has been described as "strong reproofs for a scandalous church".

We read of the beginning of this great church in Philippi in Acts chapter 16. Paul and his company went to the place of prayer and they found Lydia there. The Lord opened her heart and she and her household attended to the things Paul taught and were baptized. In the city there was a young slave girl and Paul cast the evil spirit from her. Well, that made her masters angry and they had Paul and Silas arrested, beaten and thrown into prison. At midnight, they sang and prayed and the prison doors were opened and their chains were loosed. I like to call that the "great prison revival". They taught the way of the Lord to the jailer and his household and they were baptized and converted to Christ.

In this letter to this church, there is a passage in Philippians 3:13-14 that is my favorite passage in this letter. Here is what it says, "forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

We may not want to admit it, but all of us have an imperfect past. All of us can look back and see something we are ashamed of. We all have blemishes and stains. We all have things we'd just as soon no one knew about and that we would like to forget. As great a saint as Paul was, he was no different than we are. Paul had a pretty ugly past in persecuting the church. I'm guessing that after he came to know Jesus, he had plenty of time to reflect on the shame of what he had done.

However, we do not have to be a slave to the past. When Paul thought about the kind of life he had lived, he could have just given up. He had put people in prison. More than that, he had put people to death for being Christians. Paul could have insisted there was not hope for him, there was no way the Lord could use him. Yet, Paul insisted he had something worth moving on for.

We must remember that moving on does not happen by accident. Moving on, moving forward, only happens by intentional and determined effort. Paul says, "I press on. I strive, I strain" for what is ahead. He tells us that the goal is worth the effort. In fact, Paul even calls it a prize. When our focus is on living for Jesus, we win! I am firmly convinced that one reason some folks have such a lukewarm relationship with Jesus is they see the work but they don't see the prize.

We can join Paul in this resolve. If our relationship with Jesus has been lukewarm, we can do better. Lukewarm is not what Jesus wants for

Christians sometimes are slow to pray because of their pride. They feel they are fully able to work out their own problems, they can handle each affair, they do not need the help of a superior power. This pride can damn a soul.

If the devil can stop the Christian from praying, he can to a certain extent cripple and tie the hands of the church Are you allowing him to do this in your life?

and me. Jesus wants us to be on fire for Him, loving Him, serving Him, and living for Him.

We can spend more time in the study of the word and in prayer, especially prayer. We can let God speak to us through His word. But, what we need to do more than anything else is spend time talking to God in prayer. We need to tell Him the deepest desires of our heart.

However, we must also throw unforgiveness and resentment in the wastebasket. Let's be honest. Some of us have been hurt and hurt deeply. Others have just gotten their feelings hurt a little. In any case, often folks hold on to that and refuse to forgive those even who ask our forgiveness.

To be sure, being unable or unwilling to forgive is a dangerous thing to keep in our lives. Jesus said that if we forgive, God will forgive us. He also said if we do not forgive, God will not forgive us.

What Paul is talking about here is starting over. With Jesus Christ we can do that. We can forget the things behind and reach toward the things before us. That is what Paul did. The New Testament is filled with those who made new beginnings. Folks whose life was in tatters and ruins and who had no promise of a bright future. People like Zacchaeus, the woman at Jacob's well, the woman brought to Jesus who had been caught in adultery and so many others. Through Jesus Christ they made new beginnings, and through Jesus Christ we can also make a new beginning. We can, with Paul, forget the things behind and reach toward the things that are before. We can, we should, we must.
